

Don't sneeze



2016 has been a great year for the Barrett Township Historical Society. In April we held an Open House at the former Barrett School (which will soon become senior housing) and over 500 visitors toured the building, many to meet old school friends and recall wonderful school days. As part of the open house, the Society sold bricks at \$5 each. Once the demolition is complete, we will begin distribution of the bricks that were sold.

Additional highlights this year included three round trip train excursions between Steamtown and Cresco. For each of these trips, the Society sold hot dogs, ice cream and other treats. We also entertained the travelers with music and, of course, guided tours of the Cresco Station Museum. The final trip was on October 23rd. Over 180 hot dogs were served and the rain held off until the last passenger was loaded and on the way back. Steamtown has already told us that we will certainly be on their schedule for 2017.

As in former years, we continue to have music and ice cream on the last Sunday of each month from Memorial Day through Labor Day. We began the season by saluting our veterans at the Memorial Day opening when Joanne Seese, former Society President was named "Barrett Township Citizen of the Year" by the

Barrett Rotary. Joanne is an active member of the Society and can be greeted at the Museum which is open from 1:00 until 4:00 Sundays from Memorial Day through Columbus Day. It is always a treat to hear visitors compliment us on the depth and variety of artifacts displayed at the Cresco Station Museum. For an even better treat, get a 2017 Society Calendar and let your eyes wander over almost a century of Station photographs. Yes, the new calendar is now on sale and make's a great Christmas gift for friends and families who have moved away from Barrett Township.

The monthly meetings this year have included a wide variety of guest speakers and programs. Who can forget the visit of the Queen and her Victorian Court showing fashions from Downton Abbey. On a less formal note we had a program about the Flood of '55 with remembrances from members of the Society who were there. The Jolly Tars entertained us with stories and ditties about the sea while Matthew Dodd told us stories in song about the HoBo. There was also a visit to Parkside Chapel as well as programs on Canons, topographical maps and, of course, programs on trains. 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





The summer after second grade I had a serious crush on an Older Man who lived in our neighborhood. (I was about 7, he was maybe 10.) Because he wasn't actually aware that I existed, I decided that desperate times called for desperate measures, and I locked myself in the bathroom to strategize. It struck me that a new hairstyle was in order, so I came up with what I considered a "bold statement." I made a part way over near my left ear, then slung all the rest of my hair over toward my right ear and secured the whole fabulous arrangement with handfuls of water. Why, for example, was the Wednesday pair missing every Wednesday? And why, once I got off by a single day, did the whole schedule go to pot? I worried constantly about getting into a car accident and having to explain to a surly emergency room nurse why I was wearing "Sunday" on a Tuesday. I couldn't even explain it to myself. (Childhood may have been simpler but in many respects, it wasn't actually easier.)

My generation of women would like to think we have made great strides (for example, we have no items in our lingerie drawers that can stand up by themselves, thank God), but we still invest in things designed to strangle our flesh into a more acceptable form. I can't help thinking this would have made my aunt very happy indeed.

We neither wanted nor accepted anything that came marinated or covered in a sauce. (This was actually a good thing, since no one was really offering such food choices anyway.) Above all else, we preferred that no food item on our dinner plate touched any other. I think that's why I hated stew so much. It was the ultimate indignity of food – beef, vegetables, broth – all touching each other in wild, disgusting abandonment. (Again, professional counseling might have been appropriate

Entertainment was also pretty simple during my childhood. If you had a deck of cards or a Scrabble board, you could consider yourself entertained. We also were great fans of Monopoly, although it often frustrated me. All I wanted to "be" was the little race car, but (because I had older, stronger, and nastier siblings) I usually got stuck as something lowly like the iron or the thimble. A thimble! Who ever heard of a thimble being a real estate tycoon? Obviously, I was at a disadvantage right from the get-go, which may also explain the high percentage of time I seemed to spend in "jail" without passing "go" or collecting \$200. (I found this anything but entertaining.)

For top-shelf entertainment, by the way, television programming was sublime. For me, the pinnacle of happiness was camping out on the couch with The Partridge Family, The Brady Bunch, and Happy Days, and the only hiccup was deciding who I most wanted to daydream about: David Cassidy? Greg Brady? Richie Cunningham? (That, I tell you, was the kind of dilemma a girl didn't mind having.) When something a little more upscale was called for, we turned to The Wonderful World of Disney or Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom, though let me clearly state for the record that Walt Disney and Marlin Perkins never once occupied my daydreams. Ever.

I know that life in general wasn't really simpler when I was kid, but our piece of it sure was, and I'll always be grateful for that. Yes, sometimes food on our dinner plate touched. Yes, sometimes the Older Man got away. Yes, sometimes creepy aunts disparaged your undergarments. But mostly, things were good. Really, simply, good.



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

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Get off the Treadmill and into the Woods at Paradise-Price Preserve

There's a reason treadmills dominate floor space at gyms: Walking is good for you.

Walking puts muscles to work from head to toe. It gets your heart pumping and your blood moving. Walking improves balance, strengthens bones, and cuts risk of everything from heart disease to cancer. It's even good for your brain.

But, really – walking on a treadmill? Boring! Walking a path through the woods beats the treadmill by a mile.

Paradise-Price Preserve offers woods-walking you can do no matter your fitness level. Maybe you just want to take your time and enjoy a view of open woodlands, blueberry bushes and boulders. The preserve provides a very easy, wide and grassy stroll that leads from the trailhead through a sunny forest of mixed hardwoods, to a glacial split-rock boulder as big as an elephant. This trail is about a mile round-trip, with only the gentlest of dips and rises. On a cool and sunny day in mid-fall, light seems to fill the air around you like a tangible thing. Slow, deep breaths come naturally. You'll feel your neck and shoulders relax. You'll probably start to smile.

For times when you want a real workout, there's a 2-mile trail that parallels the preserve's southern boundary. If you take it out and back from the trailhead, you get three short, steep climbs and descents each way, with lots of rock underfoot. You'll be breathing hard in a hurry, and will need to concentrate on footing and balance.

Either way, the best is yet to come. A six-minute drive over the ridge takes you to the eastern boundary of the preserve, with a glorious stretch of Brodhead Creek. Upstream, you'll see the only natural waterfall on the Brodhead, a shining and picturesque horseshoe falls. A short trail downstream through large white pines leads to trout pools, exposed bedrock, and evidence of beavers in

the bank and in the stream. An eagle may swoop by.

The 777-acre Paradise-Price
Preserve straddles the divide
between the Brodhead and Paradise
watersheds, protecting the water
quality of both. The preserve was
bought in 2011, paid for by the voters
of Paradise Township, the state
Department of Conservation and
Natural Resources, and the Monroe
County Open Space bond, with
assistance from Price Township and
Pocono Heritage Land Trust.

A third of a mile of Brodhead Creek is protected here, helping to safeguard drinking water for thousands of people downstream — and giving access to this world-class trout stream to all. On the upland part of the preserve, vernal pools provide spring breeding places for frogs and salamanders, wetlands hold water during rainy seasons and prevent downstream erosion and flooding, and countless small rills, runs and tributaries flow from the ridge to the larger streams below.

In addition to the two trails described here, many trails and woods roads crisscross the preserve. Work is underway to link existing trails to form larger loops — including a footpath to a waterfall overlook — and to connect with nearby preserves. Get off the treadmill! You'll never be bored at Paradise-Price Preserve.



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
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Monroe County Bar Foundation pledges close to \$110,000 for organizations countywide

Know Your Foods

FOOD TIPS FROM VIC

Tips about eggs;
After breakfast do you have
to scrub the egg off your pans
and plates? It is probably
because you are using hot
water to wash and soak them.
Who knew, cold water was the
answer. As soon as possible,
allow your equipment to run
under cold water; then wash
them in hot soapy water!

Perfect fried eggs; For every 2 eggs use I tablespoon of fat. Heat the fat on the heated pan until hot, not sizzling. Break eggs in a cup to assure you don't have any shell, then add to pan and immediately reduce the heat to low and cover the pan. Cook the eggs slowly until done the way you want them, Use a spatula to turn if you like them cooked on both sides. Enjoy your perfectly cooked eggs! When either frying eggs or sauteing meat or other foods, always heat the skillet before adding the fat, you'll find that food rarely sticks to the pan.

Poultry:

I have found the trick to having the Thanksgiving turkey perfectly, evenly browned and beautiful. Cover the entire bird with about 3 layers of cheesecloth soaked in melted butter. You can baste right through the cheese cloth. Your whole bird will be moist and even the leas. which tend to cook faster and dry out, will be moist and delicious! Make you own nutritious chicken and turkey stock and put the whole bird to good use. Place the rack, gizzard, neck (not the liver; freeze for other uses) in a heavy pan. Add an onion, bay

leaf, peppercorn, two

stalks of celery with tops, a couple sprigs of parsley, a carrot, and salt. Cover all with cold water and bring to a slow boil. Simmer, covered for a couple of hours or until the broth has boiled down to about half. Remove the rack and bones and strain, cool the broth. Pour into a sanitized jar and refrigerate broth. It will keep in refrigerator for several weeks or indefinitely in your freezer. I like to use pint jars for convenient usage. Discard the congealed fat before using. Great for soups, vegetables, rice, and many recipes.

Fruit: To keep fruit from turning brown after slicing try covering them with water mixed with a small amount of lemon or lime juice. Drain and pat the fruit dry before using. Strawberries should not be washed or hulled until ready to use because strawberries will absorb water. They should be washed using tepid running water (spray preferred). Gently lift the berries with your hands and on to paper towels to dry. Always serve at room temperature to enjoy the delicate full bouquet!

The best way to chop dried fruit is to snip them with kitchen scissors. Use a damp cloth to keep the blades clean. An easy way to skin peaches is to drop them into boiling water one at a time then boil 10 seconds. Skins should peel easily but if not, return to boiling water a few more

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
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



















Willing Workers award scholarships

newcomers in a training camp, stated: "Today, gentlemen, I have some good news and some bad news. First, the good news Private Peters will be setting the pace on our morning run."



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
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
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
